This project will impact on any park user across the city that parks their car at Sheldon Country Park.</p> <p>Discussions will take place with all stakeholders to assess the impact car park charging will be bring and explore possible mitigations. data will be collected from groups and businesses within and near the park, as well as the District Parks Manager and Parks staff. The EIA and consultation results from a similar project at Cannon Hill Park in 2017 highlighted a protected characteristic (Age). This EIA will then consider the impact and mitigations for this protected characteristic.</p>



<p>How will you mitigate against any negative impact to the age characteristic?</p>	<p>Feedback from public consultations from similar projects has led to the decision to revise the chargeable period for parking i.e. car park charges will begin later than originally planned, which will benefit dog walkers. In addition, the charging period will end at 5pm meaning evening parking will remain free (the benefits of which will be felt most in the summer months). This risk is also partially mitigated by the availability of free bus travel for older citizens and the public transport links to the park. In addition, an annual season ticket option will be offered for the benefit of regular park users. Park users/citizens will be asked for their opinions on a suitable pricing structure and their feedback sought on the cost of a season ticket through the forthcoming public consultation. Further reviews of the scheme will take place post implementation to identify possible opportunities to further mitigate the impact on older citizens, young people or families with a low income.</p>

There is a risk that citizens from certain religions with low incomes may be put off from visiting Sheldon Country Park as a result of the car park charging scheme.</p>
